Emergency Preparedness Checklist

The next time a disaster strikes, you may not have much time to act. Prepare now for a sudden emergency. Learn how to protect yourself and cope with disaster by planning ahead. This checklist will help you get started. Discuss these ideas with your family, then prepare an Emergency Plan.

Post the Plan where everyone can see it, on the refrigerator or bulletin board

	Find out which disasters could occur in your local area. Learn how to prepare for each disaster. Learn how you would be warned of an emergency. Identify your community's evacuation routes. Identify needs for special assistance for elderly or disabled persons. Ask your workplace about emergency plans. Learn about emergency plans for your children's school or daycare center.				
Creat	e an Emergency Plan				
	Meet with household members and discuss with children the dangers of fire, severe weather, earthquakes and other emergencies. Discuss how to respond to each disaster that could occur. Discuss what to do about power outages and personal injuries. Draw a floor plan of your home. Mark two escape routes from each room. Learn how to turn off the water, gas, and electricity at the main switches. Post emergency telephone numbers near telephones and your current address. Teach children how and when to call 911, police, fire, and medical emergencies Instruct household members to turn on the radio for emergency information. Select one out-of-state and one local friend or relative for family members to contact in the event of a disaster. It is often easier to call out-of-state than within the affected area. Pick two meeting places: - A place near your home in case of a fire. - A place outside your neighborhood in case you cannot return home after a disaster. Take a Basic First Aid and CPR Class Keep family records in a water- and fireproof container.

Evacuation Plan

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In a fire or other emergency, you may need to evacuate your dwelling at a moment's notice. You should be ready to get out fast. Develop an escape plan by drawing a floor plan of your residence. Using a black or blue pen, mark the locations of doors, windows, stairways, and large pieces of furniture. Indicate the location of emergency supplies (Disaster Supplies Kit), fire extinguishers, smoke detectors, collapsible ladders, first aid kits, and utility shut-off points. Next, use a colored pen to draw a broken line charting at least two escape routes from each room. Finally, designate a meeting place outside the home where household members should gather in the event of a fire. Be sure to include essential points outside, such as garages, patios, stairways, elevators, driveways, and porches. Use an additional sheet of paper if your home has more than two floors. Practice emergency evacuation drills with all household members at least twice a year.

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	 A supply of water (one gallon per person per day). Store water in sealed, unbreakable containers. Non-perishable packaged or canned food and a non-electric can opener. A change of clothing, rain gear, and sturdy shoes. (Store items relevant to your weather & time of year) Blankets or sleeping bags. A first aid kit and prescription medications. An extra pair of glasses, an N95 Mask, and gloves. A battery-powered radio, flashlight, and plenty of extra batteries. Credit cards and cash.

	Listen to a battery-powered radio for the location of Follow the instructions of local officials. Wear protective clothing and sturdy shoes. Take your <u>Disaster Supplies Kit</u> . Lock your home. Use travel routes specified by local officials. u are sure, you have time	eme	ergency shelters.				
	Shut off water, gas, and electricity as instructed.						
	Let others know when you left and where you are going. Make arrangements for pets. Animals may not be allowed in public shelters. Prepare an Emergency Car Kit to Include the following:
